For eight years 100 percent of YES Prep Public School graduates have been accepted to four-year colleges; 90 percent of those first generation college-bound. In addition, 75 percent of YES graduates have returned to live and work in Houston with college degrees.

"YES Prep is committed to growing without compromising its mission-driven culture and sustained academic results," said Barbic. "We have high-caliber people at every level of our organization who are

committed to doing whatever it takes to ensure that every student has a better education and opportunity for a better future."
