Goals of Glow Day

 Glow Day was offered to reinforce the importance of **PPE** and effective hand hygiene.



Advertising of Glow Day

- Flyers were emailed to all clinical directors and nursing managers on June 16<sup>th</sup> and June 22<sup>nd</sup>
- Announcements were made at the Bed Huddle on June 28<sup>th</sup> and June 29<sup>th</sup>
- Directional signs posted on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor on the day of the event
- After 4pm one educator roamed the divisions to remind staff\*

The Set-Up

- Based on evaluation of Glow Day 20 teaching experience was changed.

- As part of the set-up several patient issues were included. This provided distraction from the powder in the r

3216-The Powdered Room

- Upon arrival to room 3216 employees were narrated through various impromptu scenarios that encouraged them to interact/touch the environment.
  - Moving patient up in the bed/fluff pillows
  - Patient calling out for help
  - IV pump beeping
  - Rearrange furniture/personal belongings for safety
- After contact was made with multiple surfaces, the employee was 'called urgently' to the next room...

Room 3218-The Standard Room

- The premise of calling the employee to the next room was they heard a fall. Participants discussed how they would use lift equipment to return the patient to bed. Again, through scenario they came in contact with the environment.
- Note: Between rooms many employees wanted to gel out/in or wash their hands but were not allowed. The gel does not remove the glow powder and seemed to 'seal it' to the skin not allowing transfer.

The Reveal

- At the conclusion of the scenarios, employees were told that the first room [3216] was an isolation room. The current room [3218]was then blacklighted to show the transfer of powder from the first room. The employees' hands and clothing were then blacklighted to show the 'germs' on them.
