

Saddleback College Receives \$225,000 Grant to Provide Paid Teaching Assistant Positions to Students

Saddleback College students interested in teaching can apply for the college's Teacher Preparation Pipeline (TPP) program, which has received a grant in the amount of \$225,000 from the California Community College Chancellor's Office to provide students the opportunity

to serve as paid teaching assistants in the areas of math, science, or career technical education (CTE) at the secondary school



level. Saddleback College is one of only two community colleges in Orange County to receive continued funding through the first four years of the five-year grant. Students who are interested in the TPP program must submit an application between November 15, 2010 and January 31, 2011. Applications can be found

at www.saddleback.edu/transfer/tpp/.

Students who are accepted into the TPP program will complete 40 hours of fieldwork during the semester and will be compensated at \$10 per hour. The students are placed at one of the program's partner locations: Capistrano Unified School District, Saddleback Valley Unified School District, Coastline ROP, and Capistrano-Laguna Beach ROP. The fieldwork experience they complete fulfills a prerequisite for the California State University Fullerton's teaching credential program.

Students who are interested in the Teacher Preparation Program must enroll in Education 115, Secondary School Teaching, and must complete a background check and a TB test before they can work in a classroom.

Saddleback College Holds Criminal Justice/Substance Abuse Career Fair

Saddleback College held its 20th Annual Red Ribbon Criminal Justice/Substance Abuse Career Fair on Wednesday, October 27th in the campus quad. Approximately 50 agencies representing law enforcement, corrections, substance abuse treatment and prevention, and mental health provided information and resources as well as career opportunities for students in attendance. The event was co-sponsored by the Saddleback College Health Sciences and Human Services Department and the Associated Student Government.

The first statewide red ribbon campaign began in 1968 when Drug Enforcement Agency Agent Enrique Camareno was killed by drug traffickers. A red ribbon became the symbol of the ongoing emphasis on drug prevention and the programs that embrace the idea.

The human services department at Saddleback College offers certificates and associate degrees in the following fields: Alcohol & Drug Studies, Corrections & Criminal Justice, Eating Disorders, Generalist Human Services, and Mental Health.
