# CAST ADVOCACY GIVES YOUNG, ABUSED GIRL A NEW LIFE

Eight-year-old excels in school and finds joy in life thanks to CAST

rom the bruises on her arms, to her insecurities, to her confusion about why this abuse was happening to her, Anna began to think that hiding and trembling under her bed at night was normal and acceptable.

Last year, this viscous lifestyle finally ended with the help of Child Abuse Services and Trust. Anna Dunn's aunt informed the CAST agency of the horrific abuse happening in her 8-year-old niece's home. Within hours, CAST advocates carefully removed Anna from her home and diligently

worked and searched to find her a more suitable home.

There are
nearly 50 advocates at CAST and
that number is rapidly growing
every year. One dedicated,
passionate advocate is Sammy
Barns, who has been with CAST for
more than a decade.

"It's not easy taking a child away from their home, from their parents," Sammy said. "But we do what's best for each child—whatever that may be."

Sammy was one of the advocates involved in young Anna's case. She took part in deciding which family and living condition seemed to be most suitable. After many hours and much thought, Sammy and the other advocates choose Brad and Nicci Deere.

The Deeres' are both 35 years old, have never had children, make a good living and have flexible work hours. They live in San Antonio, Texas.

"It absolutely broke my heart when my doctor told me that I couldn't have kids,"

Nicci said. "When CAST called us, saying we were candidates for adopting Anna, and then we got chosen, my heart started to piece itself back together. I couldn't wait for this little girl be apart of our family."

Not only was Anna given new parents and new home, but also, she decided that she

wanted to transfer to a private school, where her best friend attends, and join the tennis team.



"Anna has excelled in her new school this year—inside and outside of the classroom," Brad said. "She seems truly happy and has transitioned very well. In fact, she even won the spelling bee last month."



### FAMOUS AUTHOR WRITES NOVEL ABOUT CHILD ABUSE AND DEDICATES TO CAST

Award-winning fiction author. Will Decker, writes a book about child abuse from his personal, traumatic childhood and dedicates the novel to Child Abuse Services and Trust.

Decker's novel, Never Enough Hiding Spots, tells the story of a young boy who was abused in his home every night. The book is told from a young boy's point-

of-view and is inspired by true events in Decker's childhood. The book releases in stores on April 12.

"It's not my typical suspense book," Decker said. "I thought it was time to share my story with the

world, in hopes of helping another child who has been or is being abused."

Decker did not have much access or opportunity for higher education in his hometown, Ringling, Oklahoma. However, he was determined and diligent about getting out and making a life for himself. In the past five years, Decker has won multiple awards,

Brett Turner curled in a ball on the floor of his closet, trying not to breathe too loudly. Eyes closed, hands over mouth, he waited anxiously for his abusive father to find him. What was normal to Brett was outrageous to Child Abuse Services and Trust. If it were not for Brett's nosy, concerned neighbor, 9-year-old Brett might have taken his last breath that night.

"I don't understand what I did wrong," Brett said. "Even when I did what my dad told me to do, he would still find some reason to get mad at me."
